Ending Violence against Women and Girls

The Government's 2016 - 2020 VAWG strategy, launched in March 2016, is aimed at ensuring that women get the support they need to achieve long-term changes to their lives and the lives of their children. It is based on four themes as outlined below:

- ◆ **Preventing violence and abuse** from happening in the first place.
- ◆ **Provision of services** that ensure that victims get the help they need when they need it.

- ◆ **Partnership working** - strong partnership arrangements across national, regional and local boundaries to help victims and provide an effective first response to violence and abuse.

- ◆ **Pursuing perpetrators** - an effective criminal justice response to tackling VAWG.

NICE Quality Standard – Domestic violence and abuse

Have you referred to the quality standard when planning and delivering domestic abuse support within your service?

An up to date version, published in February 2016 can be downloaded [here](#).

This quality standard is expected to contribute to improvements in the following outcomes:

- ◆ Harm from domestic violence and abuse
- ◆ Mortality from domestic violence and abuse
- ◆ Emergency attendances for domestic violence and abuse
- ◆ Quality of life

- ◆ Personal safety
- ◆ Duration of domestic violence and abuse
- ◆ Re-occurrence of domestic violence and abuse.

QUALITY STATEMENTS:

1. People presenting to front line staff with indicators of possible domestic violence or abuse are asked about their experience in a private discussion
2. People experiencing domestic violence and abuse receive a response from level 1 or 2 trained staff
3. People experiencing domestic violence or abuse are offered referral to specialist support services
4. People who disclose that they are perpetrating domestic violence or abuse are offered referral to specialist services

The Community fund

Croydon's Voluntary and Community Sector can now apply for funding for projects that ensure Domestic abuse and sexual violence is prevented where possible, victims are supported, and perpetrators are held to account.

Applications for the fund open on 22 March 2016 and the deadline for receipt of completed applications is Tuesday 24th May 2016 at 12.00pm.

In order to access the Community Fund opportunity via the London Tenders Portal, all organisations are required to email commissioning@croydon.gov.uk and express their interest so as to receive an invitation to apply via the London Tenders Portal.

Spires Streetlink

[Spires Streetlink](#) supports women involved in street based sex work. A [video](#) launched in March 2016 highlights their work as they partner with [Rape Crisis South London's](#) specialist sexual violence outreach worker to offer confidential support to women and girls aged 13+ who have experienced any form of sexual violence at any time in their lives and have also experienced societal marginalisation. This can include, yet is not limited to their involvement with the sex industry, homelessness, and the prison system.

Preparing men for change

The government's Ending Violence against Women and Girls Strategy 2016 – 2020 highlights the needs for effective interventions to prevent violence and abuse from escalating to a crisis point, with a reduction in high-rates of re-victimisation.

The responsibility to prevent further abuse is often placed on the victim. To equip practitioners with tools to better engage abusive fathers, preparing men for change training is available in Croydon.

After attending Risk Indicator Checklist training, at this two day training, practitioners cover:

- risk factors in domestic abuse cases
- problems faced when working with fathers
- techniques for engaging fathers in the process of change
- co-production of risk assessments
- strategies for reducing risk and changing behaviour.

RASASC

Rape Crisis South London (Rape and Sexual Abuse Support Centre), based in Croydon, is an independent organisation providing specialist and confidential sexual violence services for women and girls aged 13 and over, who live or work in south London and have experienced sexual violence at any point in life including child sexual abuse and sexual exploitation.
