GP PATIENT SURVEY BACKGROUND

Survey Size

Sent to around **2.3 million patients registered with a GP practice**. Received around **740,000 responses** in 2020. The response rate in 2020 was 31.7%

Criteria

Patients aged 16 or over can be sent a survey and have to have been registered with current GP practice for 6 months or more at the time of sampling

Orgs

The 2020 survey covered **6,821 GP practices** and all 135 Clinical Commissioning Groups


'Non carers' are those who answered 'No' to Q59 and 'Carers' are those who answered one of the following to Q59:

- 'Yes, 20-34 hours a week'
- 'Yes, 35-49 hours a week'
- 'Yes, 50+ hours a week'

In 2020, we received surveys from 135,000 carers

of carers are providing 50 or more hours of care per week



Carers were less likely to be in full-time paid employment across all ages



Carers aged 16 to 24 were less likely to be in full-time education compared with non carers of the same age








AUTISM OR AUTISTIC SPECTRUM CONDITION

We heard from around 700 carers with autism or an autistic spectrum condition (1.0% of carers)










How easy was the GP practice website to use? – Easy%


Have they felt isolated from others in the past 12 months? – Yes%









How easy was the GP practice website to use? – Easy%

Were you supported to manage your long-term conditions or disabilities? – Yes%






AGE

Overall, the experience of younger carers (generally those aged 44 or below) were poorer, and to a greater degree, when compared with non carers of the same age. Questions around health were particularly poorer for the youngest carers.



ETHNICITY

Overall, the experience of Asian carers and carers who selected 'Other Ethnicity' were poorer, and to a greater degree, when compared with non carers of the same ethnicity. Areas which saw a greater level of variation by ethnicity and carer status were: long-term condition status, care planning and some elements of last appointment

SUMMARY

- In some areas of primary care, carers are more likely to report a poorer experience compared to patients who are not carers.
- Today has highlighted some initial insights into how age, ethnicity, having autism or a learning disability may impact on the experience and health of carers.
- For example, carers who are autistic, have an ASC, or have a learning disability may find the GP practice websites harder to use to look for information and to access online services

Limitations of the analysis

- We have analysed data looking at different patients groups one at a time, it does not consider the intersectionality of different patient groups
- The analysis from the GP Patient Survey is just one source of information that is best complemented with other sources of insight such as knowledge of local regions for example (as the analysis was conducted at the national level)
- The survey only obtains the views of those aged 16 or over
